## GUIDELINES FOR AUTHORS

**Dijalog** is a scientific journal that publishes original papers, results of scientific research, review articles, book reviews, reflections, as well as reports on domestic and international conferences in the fields of social sciences and humanities. **Dijalog** is published quarterly. Manuscripts are accepted exclusively in electronic form via email: [dijalog@anubih.ba](mailto:dijalog@anubih.ba). If a manuscript meets the journal's criteria, as determined by the editorial board, it will be forwarded for independent peer review.

### Manuscript Submission Requirements:

- **Length:** Manuscripts should contain between 5,000 and 30,000 characters with spaces, excluding references and footnotes. Book and conference reviews should not exceed 7,000 characters with spaces.
- **Formatting:** Use Times New Roman font, size 12, with 1.5 spacing. Titles and subtitles should be unnumbered, size 12, with titles in bold and subtitles in italics. Margins should be set to 2.5 cm on an A4 page.
- **Author Identification:** Above the title, include the author's full name, and in a footnote, indicate the institution of employment and an email address for correspondence.
- **Abstract:** Provide an abstract in Bosnian, Serbian, or Croatian (at the beginning) and English (at the end of the manuscript) containing 75–150 words. Below the abstract, list 5 to 10 keywords. For manuscripts written in English, only an English abstract is required at the end.
- **Additional Information:** Include additional information in a separate footnote (\*) about the manuscript (e.g., part of a scientific project, result of specific research, etc.).
- **Transcription:** Use original transcription for foreign names and terms, adding phonetic transcription in parentheses upon first mention if applicable.
- **Footnotes:** Footnotes should only be used for explanations or additional comments. Avoid using footnotes in reviews.
- **Citation Style:** At the end of a quotation, include the author's last name, year of publication, and page number in parentheses, e.g., (Žižek, 2012: 65). For two authors: (Žižek/Horvat, 2010: 42). For multiple works by the same author published in the same year, differentiate them with lowercase letters (e.g., Rorty, 2006b: 89).

## Citing Sources in the References:

### Monographs:

- Author's full name, title of the monograph (italicized), publisher, place of publication, year of publication, page number.

Example:

- Karl Polanyi, *The Great Transformation*, Filip Višnjić, Belgrade, 2003.
- Paul Collier, *The Bottom Billion: Why the Poorest Countries Are Falling and What Can Be Done About It*, Oxford University Press, Oxford, 2007.

### Articles in Edited Volumes:

- Author's full name, title of the work (in quotation marks), "in," editor's full name (ed.), title of the edited volume (italicized), publisher, place of publication, year of publication, page range.

Example:

- Tanja Mišćević, "Negotiations between Serbia and the European Union for Concluding the Stabilization and Association Agreement," in Slobodan Samardžić (ed.), *Serbia in the EU Accession Process*, Official Gazette, Belgrade, 2009, pp. 147–152.

### Journal Articles:

- Author's full name, title of the article (in quotation marks), journal title (italicized), volume, issue number, page range.

Example:

- Lotta Harbom and Peter Wallensteen, "Armed Conflict, 1946–2009," *Journal of Peace Research*, Vol. 47, No. 4, pp. 501–509.

### Newspaper Articles:

- Author's full name, title of the article (in quotation marks), newspaper or magazine title (italicized), date, page number.

Example:

- Pierre Luther, "China Goes into the World News Business," *Le Monde Diplomatique*, April 10, 2011, p. 22.

### Documents:

- Title of the document (in quotation marks), publication (italicized), issue number (if applicable), publisher, place, and year of publication, page number.

Example:

- "Constitution of the Republic of Serbia," *Official Gazette of the Republic of Serbia*, No. 98, Belgrade, 2006, p. 20.

**Theses:**

- Author's full name, title of the thesis (italicized), type of thesis (PhD or master's), university (and faculty), date, page number.

Example:

- Goran Tepšić, *Johan Galtung's Approach to Conflict Resolution*, master's thesis, University of Belgrade, Faculty of Political Sciences, 2011, pp. 56–57.

**Online Sources:**

- Author's full name, title of the work, publisher (if applicable), full URL, access date, page number (if applicable).

Example:

- Paul Collier and Anke Hoeffler, *Greed and Grievance in Civil War*, World Bank, Washington, D.C., 2000. Available from: <http://ssrn.com/abstract=630727>, (Accessed August 7, 2010), p. 5.

**Tables and Graphs:**

- Include the number, title, and source (all in the bottom-right corner). For electronic submissions, use formats such as .jpg, .tiff, or .ai. If necessary, provide graphics in a separate document.

**Bibliography:**

- List sources alphabetically in the same format as in the footnotes, beginning with the cited author's last name. Include page numbers for articles and the total number of pages for monographs.
